



Letter From the Director

THE THEME OF 2013 WAS RE-IMAGINING THE CRANSTON PUBLIC LIBRARY. IN MY SECOND YEAR AS THE DIRECTOR, WE TOOK MAJOR STRIDES IN EVOLVING AND RE-IMAGINING LIBRARY SERVICES FOR THE RESIDENTS OF CRANSTON IN A CHANGING ECONOMIC, CULTURAL AND TECHNOLOGICAL ENVIRONMENT.

In 2013, the Arlington Reading Room underwent a six month renovation and was transformed into the Arlington Branch Library at the Cranston Senior Center. The project, which was funded by a grant from the U.S. De-

partment of Housing and Urban Development that was secured by Senator Jack Reed and the RI congressional delegation, was the culmination of over a decade of work to improve library services in the Arlington neighborhood. The new library can serve as a model for how public libraries and senior services can collaborate. With funding from the Champlin Foundations and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Central Library received a \$100,000 renovation to the Circulation Department. The project included a new expanded circulation desk with increased space for staff and materials. The staff work area was re-designed to include more work space and work surfaces for staff. The new space has increased productivity and allowed library staff to put materials into the hands of the public faster than ever. While other libraries have moved towards automation, the Cranston Public Library believes that library staff provide a valuable interaction with the public and this renovation helps us to continue to improve the user experience.

The library has continued our goal of becoming a center for digital learning. We expanded our digital literacy programs, helping our users gain the skills they need to compete in an evolving jobs market and to access health and financial information online as the role of e-government continues to grow. We increased our programs to help the public learn how to use eReaders, tablets, and access digital content. We were able to improve network infrastructure in four of our six locations, providing increased broadband and wireless Internet access. The library also continued our goal of offering access to emerging technologies as we were the first public library in Rhode Island to offer access to 3D printing technology with classes offered in partnership with the Providence makerspace AS220Labs.

The re-imagining of CPL was not limited to building renovations or technology. We hired a new Coordinator of Youth Services to begin a renewed emphasis on providing library services to the children and teens of Cranston with a focus on improved early literacy initiatives.

Finally, we wanted to hear from the public, our users, on what they think the library should be providing the community. For the first time in seven years we conducted a community assessment. We reached out to community stakeholder groups and surveyed the public to help plan for the future. That effort resulted in the new Cranston Public Library strategic plan 2014-2019. I want to thank everyone who used one of our libraries this past year - the staff of the Cranston Public Library will continue to serve your needs. We are looking forward to a great 2014!





Circulation: Top RI Public Libraries




Library Jargon Alert Circulation is the process of checking out library materials. In this case, circulation means the number of library materials that were checked out in 2013.


E-Zone

The E-Zone is the Ocean State Libraries statewide cooperative eBook and digital media lending service. All public libraries in Rhode Island support this service through cooperative purchasing of materials.

The circulation of eBooks and digital audio books among Cranston patrons increased by 32% from 2012 to 2013. Cranston now has the second highest E-Zone circulation in the state.




(Above) Just one of the many eReaders circulated at CPL's Central Library

While more patrons accessed library resources through mobile devices in 2013, this did not lead to a decrease in visits to the physical library. In fact, library visits increased by 32%.




MAPPING LIBRARY USERS

Who Uses the Library?





People of all ages use the library, but the largest group of users is between 16 and 35.



Rhode Island Family Literacy Initiative

As a member of the Rhode Island Family Literacy Initiative (RIFLI), Cranston Public Library offers English as a Second Language and citizenship classes.

In 2013 we served 75 students, 57% of whom advanced two or more reading levels. Forty-three of the students also became citizens.

Early Literacy

Early literacy programs like preschool storytime are fun bonding opportunities for caregivers and children. They also help children recognize letters and build their vocabularies, which are critical first steps in learning to read.

In 2013, the Cranston Public Library offered 259 early literacy programs, which is one for every week day that the library is open! The total attendance for these programs was 5,295 people.



Camp XL

In summer 2013, the library supported Camp XL, a summer learning program for Bain Middle School, where 75% of students are on free or reduced lunch.

This grant-funded collaboration between the YMCA, the Bain +2 Afterschool program, the Cranston Public Library, and the Cranston Area Career and Technical Center gave these middle school students the chance to develop healthy living and career skills.



FUNDING

Financial Information

The Cranston Public Library operating budget for fiscal year 2013 was \$2,890,199. In fiscal year 2013 the library received a 1.9% budget increase from the City of Cranston with an appropriation of \$2,334,538. The library also received \$524,404 in state grant-in-aid. The remainder of our operating budget came from fines and fees.

Budget Snapshot: Book Budget Trends




Although library use has only increased, the budget for books at Cranston Public Library is much lower now than it was five years ago.
